Sentences, Run-Ons, and Fragments

A <u>sentence</u> is a group of words that expresses a complete thought. Try to use complete sentences when you write.

example: Leah and I went to the park.

A <u>fragment</u> is a group of words that does not form a complete sentence. Try to avoid using fragments in your writing.

example of a fragment: Went to the park.

A r<u>un-on sentence</u> has groups of words that should be complete sentences, but they are combined into one long sentence without proper punctuation. Try to avoid writing run-on sentences.

example: I went to the park with Leah we had a terrific time.
