

Symbol: an object that stands for something else, like an idea or a feeling. Authors use symbols to add meaning to the story.

How do you know if the object is a symbol or just an object?

- There is general agreement that the object has a certain meaning, like the U.S. flag represents freedom.
- The object shows up more than once in the story.
- The object has deep meaning for a character.
- Colors, names, numbers and times of day can be symbolic.
- •Characteristics of the object can point to deeper meaning. If a rose is a symbol of love, what do the thorns mean?





Campesinos

Spanish for cowboys






Above: Traditional braided wreath hairstyle with modern makeup and accessories!

Below: Famous painter Frida Kahlo (1907-1954) often wore her hair in the traditional braided crown.






Foreshadow: to hint about future events in a story





Patio: a paved outdoor area connected to the house. It may be covered or uncovered.

Stone fountain: the focal point of a patio or courtyard. Often large and beautiful, ornate fountains were a display of wealth.


Massive wooden gates: the gates would function as security and also indicate a rich home owner.

Adobe: Spanish architecture often used bricks made of straw and mud to build thick walls, which were then covered in plaster and painted. The walls kept homes cool in summer and warm in winter.

sandwiches and sweets are served

















Hortencia was "a Zapotec Indian from Oaxaca, with a short, solid figure and blue-black hair in a braid down her back."





Tile is a traditional floor material in Spanish architecture.








Papa's silver belt buckle was one-of-a-kind. Like these modern belt buckles, Papa's was engraved with the brand of the ranch. A brand is a symbol burned onto livestock like cattle to identify the owner.











Candles are an important part of many Catholic rituals. Lighting a candle is a sacred action that symbolizes the light of Jesus Christ. In *Esperanza Rising*, Abuelita and Hortensia light candles and say prayers for Papa's safe return.
