# MAYAN MAGIC in the jungle ruins



#### Step | Instructions: Travel \_\_\_\_\_\_tile(s) due west

The number of deities that were revered in the traditions of the ancient Mayan pantheon is impressive. More interestingly, perhaps, is that these many and varied gods existed in a dynamic narrative. Over time, several of their characteristics would evolve, including their import their influence and even their existence. It is estimated that there were approximately 150 to 250 ancient Mayan deities. Amongst these, some of the most influential included Itzamna, Kinich Ahau, and Huracan. It is interesting to note that the gods of the ancient Mayan, although formidable and supernatural, were nevertheless imperfect. They were, much like people, subject to making poor decisions and pursuing flawed goals. In fact, some of these gods were even said to have been destroyed by mere mortal men.

Growing up in the jungle ruins of the ancient Mayan people certainly was memorable. My youth was very unique. How many children can say they grew up wandering amongst the pyramids of Chicken Itza, roaming the overgrown ruins of Calakmul and pretending to be a warrior of old amongst the coastal structures of Tulum? I'd never chastise my parents' decision to allow me to roam so freely amongst the ancient structures. I'm sure they wouldn't have if they knew the power contained in that underground chamber. Once I had a taste for the magic of old, there was no turning back. This was a cause definitely worth devoting a lifetime to pursue.

### Step 3 Instructions: Travel \_\_\_\_\_\_tile(s) due east

Many of the ancient traditions have been lost to us forever, including the ability to cure the many plagues of the jungle with local vegetation the ability to accurately predict major weather events based upon signs from wildlife and the ability to harness the power of the sun. Occasionally, a new manuscript is uncovered, shedding insight into the ancient ways. For instance, it was recently discovered that the summer solstice was an important time to summon supernatural powers. Through rituals, the power of the sun could be stored in gemstones including sapphire ruby and amethyst. These powerful gemstones could be used to build to destroy to cure or to kill. The Mayans used an elaborate system of hieroglyphs to record their knowledge beliefs and customs. Their system of writing took many years to understand by modern academics. In the late 1950s, an archaeologist named Tatiana Proskouriakoff made significant gains in understanding some of the glyphs utilized by the Mayans. Unfortunately, many of the ancient Mayan manuscripts, or Codices, were destroyed by European explorers during first contact. The codices that still remain today include the Paris Codex the Dresden Codex and the Madrid Codex.

## Step 5 Instructions: Travel \_\_\_\_\_\_tile(s) due east

The ancient Mayans possessed, for the their time, a truly advanced concept of time, and they used multiple calendars. Mayans used different calendars for different purposes. Some of these included the Long Count Calendar a sacred calendar known as the Tzolkin and a 365 day solar calendar (much like that which we use). Some interesting math properties were evident in the Mayan calendar system, including the concept of zero the use of common multiples and the evidence of combined cyclical/linear trends. The calendar was used in various ways. It was used to determine when to harvest crops, when to stay inside in order to avoid dangerous supernatural events and even when to launch war campaigns. Contrary to popular belief, the Mayan Long Count Calendar never predicted a doomsday marking the end of the world.
