

Ruby Bridges

Ruby Bridges was born on September 8, 1954 in Tylertown, Mississippi. She grew up on a small farm with three brothers and one sister. At four years old, her family moved to New Orleans, Louisiana. Ruby was a happy, playful child. She enjoyed playing ball, jumping rope and climbing trees just like many other children. At that time, schools in New Orleans were segregated. Ruby went to an all-black kindergarten where she loved school and loved her teacher. Her school was a long distance from her home and she walked there every day. White children in her neighborhood went to a different school that was much closer to their homes.



Ruby, a good student, was selected to be able to attend first grade at a white school officials beginning because were desegregate schools in New Orleans. Many white people were angry about the decision for all students to attend school together, so Ruby's parents were worried that it might not be safe. They finally decided to send her to first grade at William Frantz, an all-white elementary school that was much closer to their home. Ruby is known as the first black child to attend an all-white school.

On November 14, 1960, Ruby bravely attended her first day at the new school. Some people were still trying to keep her from attending. Many protested and threatened her. To help Ruby remain safe, some U.S. Marshals arrived to escort her to school. Though some people were angry with her, Ruby wasn't The Core Coaches 2016

frightened by them. Because of all the chaos, she spent that first day sitting in the principal's office.

Over time, many parents took their white children out of the school. Ruby was the only black child in the school and she was in a classroom all by herself. She liked her first grade teacher Mrs. Henry and she enjoyed learning from her. There were very few other white children who attended the school that year. People who were against integration continued to threaten the families of the children who stayed. Others respected Ruby for her courage. They supported her family sending cards, well-wishes encouragement.

After first grade, Ruby attended integrated classes for the rest of her school years. She even graduated from a desegregated high school. Later, she worked as a travel agent for 15 years. She married Malcom Hall and they had four sons. In 2001, Ruby was awarded the Presidential Citizen's Medal. As an adult she was also reunited with her beloved Ist grade teacher, Mrs. Henry. Ruby continues to support the fight for tolerance and promotes respect for all people. She once said, "Don't follow the path. Go where there is no path and begin the trail."
